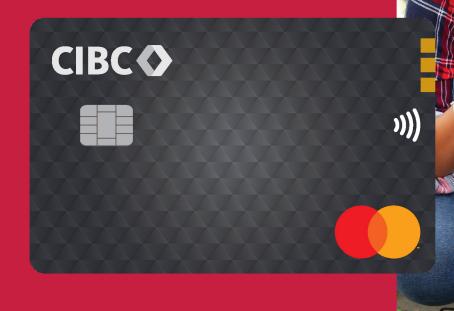

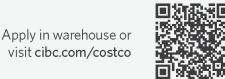

CRUST

125 mL (½ cup) raw, unsalted almonds 60 mL (¼ cup) unsweetened flaked coconut 60 mL (¼ cup) coconut oil 45 mL (3 Tbsp) maple syrup 1 mL (¼ tsp) salt 125 mL (½ cup) rolled oats

FILLING

125 mL (½ cup) heavy cream, chilled 250 mL (1 cup) mascarpone, softened at room temperature 80 mL (½ cup) powdered sugar 5 mL (1 tsp) vanilla Zest of one lemon

TOPPING

Heat oven to 180 C (350 F) and lightly grease a 25 cm (10-in.) tart pan with removable bottom.

To make the crust, pulse almonds and coconut in a food processor until fine. Add coconut oil, maple syrup and salt and process until smooth. Add rolled oats and process until coarse. Place mixture in tart pan and press onto bottom and sides. Bake for 12 minutes and allow to cool.

For the filling, whip heavy cream to stiff peaks with a mixer and set aside. In a separate bowl, beat mascarpone until smooth. Add powdered sugar, vanilla and lemon zest and beat until smooth and fluffy. Gently fold whipped cream into mascarpone mixture. Spread filling into cooled tart crust and refrigerate for two hours.

Slice **Fresh Strawberries** and coat with sugar, if desired. Add the strawberry topping once tart is cooled.

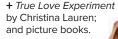

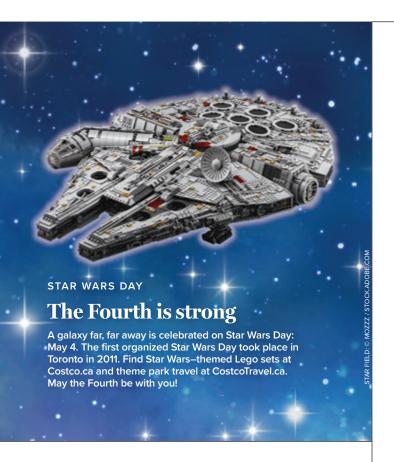

ORANGE AND FENNEL

Slow-Roasted Salmon

680 g (11/2 lbs) salmon fillet

- 45 mL (3 Tbsp) extra-virgin olive oil, divided
- 1 orange
- 1 fennel bulb, halved and thinly sliced, reserving some fronds
- 1 shallot, thinly sliced
- 1/2 lemon, zested and juiced
- 10 mL (2 tsp) honey 125 mL (1/2 cup) chopped fresh herbs (basil, tarragon, dill or mint) 2 mL (1/2 tsp)
- coarse salt 1 mL (1/4 tsp) freshly cracked black pepper

Preheat oven to 93 C (200 F). Set a rack in the middle of oven. Place salmon on a parchment-lined baking sheet (skin side down), then brush the top with 7 mL (1/2 Tbsp) olive oil.

Slice orange in half and juice one half, then peel the other half and thinly slice the fruit into half moons.

Put the remaining olive oil; orange pieces and juice; fennel; shallot; lemon zest and juice; honey; herbs; and salt and pepper in medium bowl; add chopped fennel fronds if desired. Gently stir to combine.

Pour mixture over top of salmon. Roast salmon for 30 to 45 minutes, depending on thickness of the fish. The colour will remain a more vibrant orange than other baked salmon recipes, looking undercooked, though it's not. (The suggested internal temperature for fish is 70 C/158 F.)

Remove salmon from oven, serve it straight from the sheet pan and scoop any extra pan juices on top. Makes 6 servings.

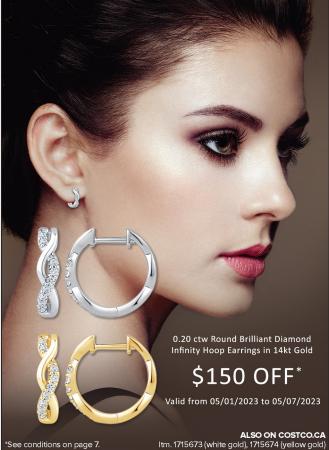

Build your business

How to accommodate customers with disabilities

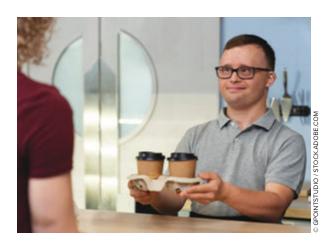
eople with disabilities are a large and underserved consumer group. Did you know that approximately one in five Canadians over the age of 15 has at least one disability? Or that seniors are Canada's fastest-growing age group, soon to make up 25% of the population? Making your business accessible to them can have a positive impact on its reputation, long-term sustainability and bottom line.

Language matters

People with disabilities often say the most challenging barrier to overcome is other people's attitudes. Educate yourself and your staff about the various types of disabilities and what is considered respectful language. Language is dynamic and ever evolving, but a good practice is to use people-first language—for example, "person with a disability," "people with epilepsy" or "individual who uses a wheelchair." If in doubt, just ask the person what term they prefer.

Removing barriers

Many people are surprised to learn that 70% of disabilities are not visible. This means that stairs aren't the main barrier for most people with disabilities. A customer



with low vision may need to have information read out loud. A customer with a speech disability may need you to repeat, rephrase or write down what you've heard. A customer with joint pain may appreciate being able to sit down while being served.

In addition to letting customers know that they can request assistance from you, there are other barriers you can easily eliminate, such as clearing pathways, placing items within reach, offering accessible versions of written and digital materials, ensuring signs are clear and easy to read, providing adequate lighting and offering sensory-friendly shopping times.

Spreading the word

A website designed in a way that people with disabilities can easily navigate is also a good investment. Doing so makes it easier to use for everyone, improves search engine optimization and can attract new customers. Aim to meet the international standards for website accessibility outlined in the Web Content Accessibility Guidelines (w3.org).

The question to ask yourself is not why your business should be more accessible to people with disabilities, but rather how you can make life easier for those customers.

There are many things you can do to become a more accessible and inclusive business owner. Here are some suggestions to get started:

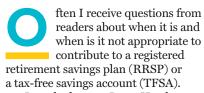
- Offer accessibility awareness training to your staff.

Funding retirement

A look at getting the best from contributing to a retirement account

I reached out to Jason Heath, a certified financial planner and managing director of Objective Financial Partners Inc., for his tips on when it does and does not make sense to contribute to your RRSP. Here's what he had to say.

• RRSP contributions save you tax because you can deduct them from your income. If you had an income of \$75,000 in 2022, an annual \$100 RRSP contribution will reduce your taxable income and save between \$28 to \$38 of tax, depending on your province or territory of residence. That means a tax savings of 28% to 38% on the RRSP only. If you make a larger contribution, or if you have other tax deductions, like child care expenses or pension contributions, for example, you may not save as much tax. As your taxable income goes down, so too does the tax savings from an RRSP contribution or other deduction.



- If your taxable income is below \$50,000, the tax rate you pay on withdrawing from your RRSP in retirement may be higher than the tax rate you save on the initial contribution. This can make RRSP contributions questionable at lower levels of income. The higher your income is above \$50,000, the more beneficial RRSP contributions could be for you. If your income is below \$50,000, a TFSA may be a better way to save.
- If you have debt, you need to reconsider investing versus paying down debt. Investors with a low risk tolerance may not earn a high enough rate of return to be better off contributing to an RRSP or a TFSA compared to paying down debt. This is especially true if you have no employer matching contributions, like a group RRSP or a defined contribution pension plan, or if you have high-interestrate debt, like a balance you are carrying on your credit card.

 The interest you paid on money you borrowed to contribute to an RRSP

Laptops with OLED screens have jaw-dropping displays and emit less blue light

o doubt you've seen super-slim televisions with gorgeous screens powered by OLED (organic light-emitting diode) technology. These amazing displays on TVs are also found in some premium smartphones and computer monitors—and now, laptops.

Because they display clean, stunning images, OLED laptops are ideal for content creators, such as digital artists, graphic designers, photographers, video editors, game designers and animators. Computer gamers and movie lovers will appreciate the up to 120-hertz refresh rates of most OLED screens, which allow fast-moving images to be rendered smoothly.

Dream screen

OLED (pronounced "oh-led") is a carbon-based semiconductor film layer that emits light when electricity is applied. The result is an amazingly beautiful image; in part because each pixel is its own light source, there's no backlighting required, unlike other screen technologies, including LCD. As a result, OLED screens produce incredible contrast levels.

Along with producing deep, dark blacks, colours on an OLED display seem to pop off the screen. This is primarily because of the high contrast levels and the ability to display more colours, and with greater colour accuracy. According to laptop manufacturer ASUS, its OLED screens can display more than 60 times more colours than its LCD laptops can. That amounts to 1.07 billion compared to 16.7 million.

Other OLED advantages

OLED screens also display a greater consistency of brightness across the screen. They produce up to 600 nits (a unit of brightness); most laptop LCD screens only produce up to 250 nits. This technology provides wider viewing angles and is easier on your eyes; you're exposed to up to 70% less harmful blue light than with most LCD screens, because OLEDs use only the light needed without the white backlight.

Several factors should go into deciding which laptop is for you: the processor (the engine that drives your computer's performance), graphics capabilities (important for gamers), the amount of storage and the kind of drive to go with (hard drive or solid-state) and how much system memory (aka RAM) you need—and you can add screen technology to that list.

Once you use a laptop with an OLED display, it will be difficult to go back to anything else. ■

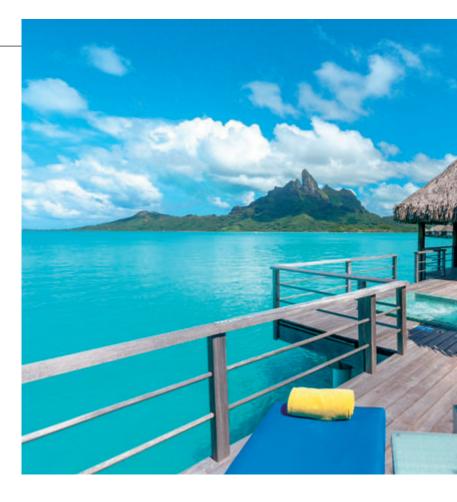

Tahitian treasures

Tahiti and her islands will stimulate and soothe your senses

ew places conjure up as strong a mental image as Tahiti. The food is a magical mix of French and South Pacific cuisines, the hotels are as decadent as a triple hot fudge sundae and the water comes in colours crayon makers haven't even invented. You'll also find a warm and welcoming culture that embraces visitors from around the world.

Tahiti is great for honeymoons, but it's also wonderful for families and soft-adventure lovers, and it can be surprisingly affordable.

Here's a look at some of my favourite places, activities and, of course, food.

Bora Bora

An overwater bungalow in Tahiti is sheer magic, with views of craggy, green Mount Otemanu and Mount Pahia rising out of the crystal-clear Bora Bora lagoon. One of the great activities here is a cultural lagoon tour, which will allow you to swim with manta rays

and harmless blacktip sharks, paddle a Tahitian canoe and enjoy a shady, homemade lunch.

Casual Bloody Mary's restaurant (think open air, with sand on the floor) has been attracting Hollywood A-listers and sports celebrities for decades. The fish of the day can be expensive, but you can also grab a burger and a beer.

Tahiti Island

The main island of Tahiti is home to the capital, Papeete. Head south to the quiet peninsula called Tahiti Iti (Little Tahiti), where you can go on half-day water tours of the peaceful southern section of the island. You'll glide over stunning blue water and check out sensational surfing spots (the surfing competition for the Paris 2024 Summer Olympics will be held here) and towering, spiky green mountains. You can also find tours of the rugged, almost entirely deserted Papenoo Valley, home to lush jungle growth, sweet-smelling flowers and sparkling waterfalls.





You can take a short ferry trip from Papeete to beautiful Moorea. Try renting a moped and do an around-theisland tour of your own, checking out homes and elegant overwater bungalow resorts, as well as the jagged peaks that rise over serene Cook's Bay.

Tahaa

Tahaa is known around the world for its vanilla farms. You can hire a local guide to take you on a tour of fertile valleys and vanilla plantations, where you learn how vanilla plants have male and female parts that have to be pushed together (they call it a "marriage") before the vanilla pod can begin growing.



Raiatea

This beautiful, low-key island is great if you want a taste of old Tahiti, with no big resorts, about 13,000 residents and virtually no traffic. Fish & Blue restaurant serves excellent sushi and seafood, and the décor is like a dreamy, upscale beach house. The south end of the island is home to Marae Taputapuatea, the remains of an old Polynesian temple area that's a UNESCO World Heritage site.

Huahine

This island (technically two islands separated by a few metres) is a great place to get away from it all. Take a hike through the thick, green forests or hit a local market in one of the eight small villages for fresh island bananas, melons and vanilla. Huahine Chez Tania is a fun, casual spot for barbecue on a warm, sunny day.

Flights from Seattle operate on Wednesdays and Sundays, with a return on Tuesdays and Saturdays. The routes are serviced by Boeing

787-9 Dreamliner aircraft, which feature 30 lie-flat business-class seats, 32 premium economy seats and 232 standard economy seats.—JB

Fairness in farming

Equitable Food Initiative and Fairtrade are two non-profit certification programs focused on improving farmworker conditions and agricultural standards worldwide, which in turn lessens environmental impacts and improves food safety.

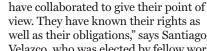
with instructions on warm-up exercises and proper use of equipment, such as carts to transport the produce.

Being part of the organization enabled the farms to act quickly when health and safety guidelines were updated during the pandemic. For example, Andrew & Williamson increased sanitizing of communal areas, carts and tools, farmworkers wore personal protective equipment, such as face coverings and gloves, and practiced social distancing.

Similarly, 16 years ago, banana supplier Equifruit, located in Montreal, partnered with Fairtrade (fairtrade.ca), a global non-profit certification system that set standards for better prices, decent working conditions and fair terms of trade. Since 2021, Equifruit has supplied Costco warehouses in the Toronto area with organic and Fairtrade-certified bananas from two cooperatives. Appbosa is a cooperative made up of 555 small producers farming collectively in Peru and employing 385 community members. Asoguabo is a cooperative located in Ecuador founded by a group of smallscale farmers, which has grown to 132 banana farms.

Cooperatives band together jointly to invest in communal improvements, such as produce packing stations, and create quality control and certification review teams building export relationships with Fairtrade licensees, says Jennie Coleman, president and owner of Equifruit. Cooperatives and suppliers work with Fairtrade to eradicate outdated banana business practices.

"When we look at how low prices for bananas at production level are achieved, they're often achieved through cutting corners on wages for workers,

Empowering the farmers

Eleven years ago, El Milagro de Baja partnered with Equitable Food Initiative (EFI; equitablefood.org), a non-profit certification program focused on improving working conditions for farmworkers and raising agricultural standards internationally. El Milagro de Baja supplies strawberries to Costco through its parent company, Andrew & Williamson Fresh Produce, under the GoodFarms brand.

The organization provides workers with updated training on health and food safety regulations, including hygiene, proper hand-washing and sanitation. Workers are also trained on how to identify sexual harassment in the workplace and on health and safety issues, including injury prevention,









investments in working conditions for workers and on environmental practices. And so under Fairtrade we don't want to see those corners cut," says Coleman. "We want to be proud to stand behind a product which doesn't reflect that kind of toxic, 100-plus-year-old way of doing business. And while this might make a Fairtrade banana a little bit more expensive, it is still a very, very affordable fruit."

Protecting the environment

In addition to improving farmworker conditions, EFI and Fairtrade support lessening the environmental impacts of agricultural businesses.

Farms are expected to reduce the amount of pesticides used on crops in conjunction with pesticide-management tactics. For example, farm-friendly insects, such as ladybugs, are introduced to eat other pests that are harmful to crops. Marigolds planted at the end of rows deter unwanted insects. Strips and boxes holding a liquid that attracts and traps pesky insects are placed around the perimeters.

Some farms also use vacuum-cleaner-like machines that suck up unwanted pests. Others have microbiology teams that produce beneficial fungi, which are applied to the soil to fight pathogens that are harmful to plants. And others use rainwater reservoirs or water desalination plants to help with water management, providing water for the crops through drip irrigation systems or micro sprinklers instead of traditional sprinkler systems, where about 60% of the water is carried away by wind or lost to evaporation.

For example, the Appbosa cooperative built a water supply system that collects 30% of the water used on the plantation that was previously washed away. The run-off water is used for the bananas and improves productivity by cutting the amount of time it takes to water the crops from four hours to two.

How Fairtrade works

Fairtrade's approach enables farmers and workers to have more control over their lives and decide how to invest in their future, says Julie Francoeur, CEO of Fairtrade Canada. Produce with the Fairtrade mark means producers and businesses have met internationally agreed upon standards, which have been independently certified. Farmers and workers have a strong voice at every level of Fairtrade, from how they invest in and run their local organizations to having an equal say in Fairtrade's global decision-making.

"Fairtrade is more than just about certification. It's a movement for change that believes farmers and workers know what's best for their businesses and for their communities. It's about redistributing the power in supply chains and ensuring they have an equal say," Francoeur says.

The Fairtrade Minimum Price aims to cover the average costs of producing sustainable crops. The Fairtrade Premium, an extra sum of money paid on top of the selling price to invest in business or community projects. Between November 2021 and January 2023, more than \$245,670 from cases of bananas purchased by Costco has gone back to the cooperatives in Peru and Ecuador.

Since 2003, the farmers of Appbosa have invested in local schools, health centres, potable running water for homes, a women's leadership and entrepreneurship workshop and a cable-way system for banana transportation from the farm to packing stations and refrigerated storage facilities. Asoguabo has invested in initiatives, such as equipping children with school bags, providing retirement care for seniors, building schools for disabled children, providing a shelter for victims of sexual violence and ensuring the safety of drinking water.

The EFI approach

EFI's approach also focuses on empowering farmworkers at all levels to help solve issues on the farms.

From the consumers' perspective, the EFI certification on fruits and vegetables signifies that the workers harvesting the produce have been treated respectfully and compensated fairly, says Ruzzamenti. And growers are assured that the workforce has been given the skills and support to address critical issues like food safety and traceability, so they can excel in a global marketplace.

Currently, 54 farms have been certified (26 in Mexico, 24 in the U.S., three in Canada and one in Peru) and 10 more are pending certification with leadership trained. This means more than 55,000 workers are on farms with trained EFI teams.

Farms in Canada and other countries certified by EFI are paid a premium by retailers for produce meeting the requirements of the programs. The premium on certified produce appears on the workers' checks as an EFI bonus. Since 2017, the program has generated over \$19 million in farmworker bonuses.

Growers also benefit from engaged workers who report higher work satisfaction and help solve issues. Amalia Zimmerman-Lommel, director of social responsibility for Andrew & Williamson Fresh Produce, says the program relieves pressure on farm managers, because now the workforce is communicating, collaborating and problem-solving. That in turn increases productivity and quality.

"No person or situation is perfect, so continuous improvement is part of this culture change," Zimmerman-Lommel says. "The culture change goes both ways, from the workforce to top management, there is improvement for all and everyone participates in improving processes with clear and transparent communication."

Annual audits

Both EFI and Fairtrade work with a third-partycertified auditing body to verify the farms follow the standards set by each organization. When audits are completed and farms are certified, which can vary in length of time depending on the number of workers, the farms are allowed to label produce as coming from a certified supplier. Annual audits, which include worker interviews, are conducted to ensure the farms remain in compliance and any new workers have been trained.

The certificate holder is responsible for reporting to the non-profit, as well as the committees, the amount of product sold. This determines the amount of premiums generated, which are evaluated and audited as well.—CG

An elected leadership team of farmworkers and managers is trained in communication, collaboration and problem-solving skills, and then applies those skills to help the farming operation meet EFI standards, which focus on working conditions, food safety and pest management.

Produce at Costco

EFI and Fairtrade each provide a verifiable program that helps enrich the lives

Pickleball power

The funny-named sport is transforming first-time players into full-time fanatics

Find pickleball sets and other athletic equipment in most Costco warehouses and at Costco.ca. hen Costco member Denise
Jagoda first swapped her
tennis racket for a pickleball
paddle, she quickly discovered why nearly 5.8 million people in
the United States and Canada have
made pickleball one of the world's
fastest-growing sports.

Pickleball is played on a court roughly one-fourth the size of a tennis court. As with tennis, players serve, volley and hit ground strokes, but pickleballers use a solid-surface paddle and a perforated plastic ball. Serves must be underhanded, making pickleball easier for beginners. Games are played to 11 points and must be won by two points; points are won only while serving.

Professional Tyson McGuffin of Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, describes pickleball as the likely outcome if "pingpong, badminton and tennis had a baby and that baby was extremely social, super embracing and there was a lot of camaraderie."

The small court creates fast-paced fun and built-in socializing, attributes

that made Jagoda an enthusiastic convert to the sport. "I've never gotten so much joy playing something," the Temecula, California, resident says. "I love this game."

A social sport

Pickleball was cobbled together in 1965 by three dads on a backyard badminton court on Bainbridge Island, Washington. Nearly 60 years later, the game has rocketed from obscurity to rock-star status.

USA Pickleball chief marketing officer Chuck Menke says the pandemic served as a "hyper accelerator" for the sport by providing a social and recreational outlet for quarantine-fatigued people of all ages who could reconnect at safe distances on a pickleball court.

McGuffin credits pickleball's exploding popularity to the fact that new players, no matter their age or ability, can step onto a court and quickly have a 10-ball rally even if scoring points is challenging. "It's easy to get good," he explains. "It's very difficult to get great."



Tom Keane, president and cofounder of the East Toronto Pickleball Association, maintains that pickleball's unpretentious atmosphere is the secret of its success. "I firmly believe I could travel anywhere in the world to a pickleball court and somebody would say, 'Here's a paddle to borrow, buddy. Jump on a court.' I don't think that would happen in many other sports," says Keane, who started playing in 2021. "It's just a different breed of people."

The pickle history

The truth about how pickleball got its name debunks a tail-wagging tale. Jeff Pritchard, nephew of pickleball co-inventor Joel Pritchard, notes that his aunt Joan Pritchard borrowed the term "pickle" from collegiate crew, where the "pickle boat" is filled by random rowers not selected for competitive races. Pickleball became a fitting name for a game combining pieces of other games.

While an often-repeated tale maintains pickleball was named after the Pritchards' family dog, Pritchard explains that the cocker spaniel arrived later and was named after the game. "[Pickles] is a fun story, but it isn't accurate. The boat story is the true origin of the name," the Costco member says.

More than a game

Mo Waja, a pickleball player in Ottawa, says the sport has motivated him on many levels. "It's inspired travel and adventure and helped build new friendships," the Costco member says.

Dick Johnson of Boise, Idaho, and Mesa, Arizona, discovered the game a decade ago after elbow and spinal fusion surgery curtailed a successful amateur tennis career, which led to weight gain and diabetes. The Costco member praises pickleball for helping to restore his health.

"I came to Arizona, found this great diabetic program, lost weight, got off the meds and concurrently discovered pickleball," says Johnson, a multi-champion senior player.

"Those things together saved my life."

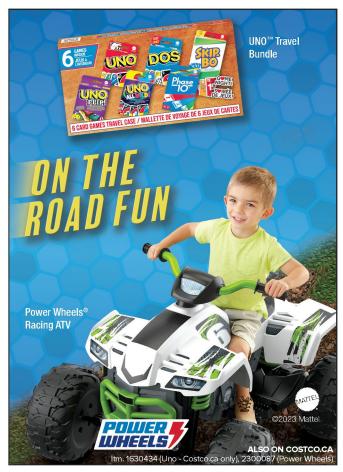

Fun for all

Vacationing with an anxious, inflexible or neurodiverse child

ummer is when most families take their vacations, but for the majority of families whose children have "invisible needs" such as autism spectrum disorder (ASD), attention-deficit/hyperactivity disorder (ADHD) and bipolar disorder, travel dangles like a dream just beyond their grasp. However, thanks to a recent focus on travel inclusion, travel doesn't need to remain a dream.

A 2018 survey of families with children on the spectrum showed that while 87% of families with invisible needs don't travel, 93% said they would if they knew the right travel strategies, such as how to limit or avoid sensory meltdowns (caused by an overwhelming barrage of unfamiliar sounds, smells and other stimuli) and how to make travel part of the predictable routine their children need. Their other requirement: locating destinations that cater to their unique needs, such as providing ways to avoid long lines and posting

signage that identifies where children can go in a theme park or museum to decompress.

And such strategies aren't just for kids with special needs. Once they are removed from their comfort zone, all children have the potential to become anxious and inflexible.

Strategies to enhance every vacation

Successful family travel starts with introducing the concept of travel far in advance of the vacation. Find picture books with your children's favourite characters in travel situations, watch videos that preview every aspect of the upcoming trip and incorporate role play of appropriate behaviour.

Start small with mini experiences, such as the Premium Kids event that has been held for several years at Montréal-Trudeau International Airport, usually in April, and provides participants with a dress rehearsal of the airport experience from arrival up until boarding.



You can also stay at a friend's house or local hotel before a long hotel stay to discover where any sensory triggers may lie, set up a tent in the backyard before a camping trip or take a commuter train ride before a longer journey. Label trips to museums or garage sales as "tours," because a successful local experience can create a positive frame of reference for actual tours taken at vacation sites.

Certification programs

Thanks to a growing number of certifying organizations, travel professionals and suppliers are becoming more knowledgeable and empathetic about the needs of those on the spectrum. Foremost is the

International Board of Credentialing and Continuing Education Standards (IBCCES; Ibcces.org), which trains travel professionals as Certified Autism Travel Professionals.

Venues

In the case of indoor attractions. accommodations can include making photos and schedules available to visitors in advance to provide predictability, and posting maps, arrows and signs throughout the facility.

Certified parks and other outdoor attractions may provide sensory guides that list what sensory materials, such as sand and rubber, might be encountered; whether family restrooms and ramps are offered; where quiet and shady places are available; and the existence of potentially risky features such as ponds that pose a danger for individuals who may be drawn to water or tend to wander.

At theme parks, along with providing quiet areas to decompress, and sensory guides and signage alerting visitors to potentially unpleasant lights and unusual smells, accommodations can mean creating procedures so those on the spectrum can avoid long waiting lines, and use of a stroller as wheelchair to accommodate children who can't stand for prolonged periods of time.

With these destinations and strategies in place, take the advice of Michelle Zeihr of Barrie, Ontario, the mother of two girls, one of whom is on the spectrum with ASD and ADHD: "Don't be afraid to go. The more you travel with [your children with invisible needs], the easier it gets. Remember, where there's a will, there's a way." ■



For the family

Along with autism-friendly resorts with kids' clubs, theme parks and cruises. camping and sports vacations can be great choices for families with both neurotypical (nonautistic) and neurodiverse children. Camping offers several options (tent, cabin, RV) and the freedom to determine your destination and daily activities. Meanwhile, individual sports, such as adaptive skiing, horseback riding, golf, scuba diving and even surfing, are more conducive for children on the spectrum because they can participate without stress-filled social interaction. Neurotypical children can use the vacation to learn new skills or improve old ones. Everyone returns home with a new skill and happy memories.-DMB

Avoiding meltdown

Creating a child-centric vacation can prevent meltdowns before they start: Vet two or three desti-

nation options and then

let the child decide.

- Avoid overstimulation by pacing the trip to the child's abilities.
- Carry a go-to bag with snacks, noise-cancelling headphones, etc.
- Include activities focused on a child's special interest or passion.
- Arrange the vacation with a Certified Autism Travel Professional (autismtravel. com/travel-agents).—DMB

Soak in the savings

Inflatable hot tubs offer value and convenience

earning for the soothing sensation of a hot tub without the high expense? Consider a space-saving, plug-andplay inflatable hot tub, which can be easily set up for seasonal enjoyment.

A portable hot tub—typically made of PVC, nylon and other synthetic fabrics—is inflated with air, filled with water from a garden hose and attached to a pump that inflates, heats, filters and powers the unit when plugged into a nearby external GFCI (ground fault circuit interrupter) outlet. Best placed in a sheltered yard area and topped with a protective cover, it's designed to operate in warmer months when the temperature is above freezing. Best of all, an inflatable hot tub can fit nearly all budgets.

Brian Taylor, a Costco member in St. John, New Brunswick, says he loves the inflatable hot tub he purchased from Costco. "Two people can easily move it to wherever you want to use it," he says. "Ours is set up conveniently behind our house and we use it two or three times a week."

Matt Vartola, vice president of business development for Bestway USA, a Costco sup-

plier of inflatable hot tubs, says they "have the same basic features and functions of traditional hot tubs at a fraction of the cost, with easy-to-replace parts and only simple maintenance required." (See "Expected upkeep.")

However, inflatable hot tubs usually are smaller in size than hard-shell models, have less-powerful jets and shouldn't be placed in direct sunlight or exposed to rain or snow, which can degrade the materials.

Owning an inflatable hot tub in Canada can be a comforting and relaxing experience, according to Marissa Johnson, founder of Inflatableblast.com, which provides information on a variety of inflatable objects. "A hot tub provides numerous health benefits, such as relieving muscle tension and soreness, improving sleep and reducing stress," she says. "It can be easily deflated and stored during the winter months, too."

If you're warming up to the idea of an inflatable hot tub, now might be a good time to jump in. ■

Expected upkeep

To prolong the use and lifespan of your inflatable hot tub, prepare to:

 Apply manufacturerrecommended chemicals (often chlorine or bromide tablets) regularly to maintain proper pH balance.

- Check the filter daily, rinse it weekly and replace it every three months.
 - Drain the water every

few weeks or when dirty, hand-clean all materials with gentle detergent (one that won't hurt the liner) and refill.

• Take a shower before use (residues on the skin can degrade the materials).—EJM

Perfectly packed

Enhance your trip by getting organized

A variety of luggage is available in Costco warehouses and at Costco.ca. o you love the joys of vacation travel but hate packing for it?

It's a seemingly straightforward task that many people dread, but a few clever tactics can make it quicker, easier and altogether less stressful.

The right luggage

First things first. Before buying new luggage, think about how and where you'll be using it, to ensure you choose something with useful features for your journey.

For instance, wheeled rigid suitcases are easy to move, highly durable and offer protection in transit, making them perfect for many trips, including resort vacations and cruises. However, soft backpacks or carry-ons may be a better choice for multistop tours where your bag will be stowed in numerous vehicles, especially if luggage space is awkward or restricted.

Hybrid bags, meanwhile, have both wheels and zip-away back straps, which are ideal for walking and navigating trickier spaces, such as stairs.

Plan your packing

Effective packing is all about planning, according to professional travel blogger Monica Stott of The Travel Hack (thetravel hack.com). "Always write a packing list," she says. "It will be quicker to pack your bags and you won't overpack or sneak in any extra just-in-case items."

As part of this process, plan your outfits first and be selective, opting for mix-and-match garments that complement each other and can be worn on multiple occasions, dressed down for daytime or accessorized for evening wear.

Pack smart

Though it's difficult to completely eradicate creases, Stott recommends rolling up clothes and placing them in zipped packing cubes to compress them and save space. This also helps with organization, making it easier to find things at the destination.

Ebgo is making electric bikes fun and affordable

ric Alain is proud of the success that Ebgo has enjoyed since he started the electric bike company in 2013 in the garage of his family's home in Victoriaville, Quebec. But he's even more pleased by the boost he believes his business has given to the popularity of e-bikes in Canada by supplying the market with quality products at

"It's easy to build a \$10,000 electric bike using the best brand-name parts," Alain says. "The challenge is to make a reliable bike for under \$3,000. By doing that, we're helping to democratize e-bikes, which are great for people of all ages who want to get around and go further in a safe and environmentally friendly way."

According to Alain, quality and affordability were top of mind when he and his son Charles first started tinkering with e-bike designs in 2013. "We saw it as a promising business venture," recalls Alain, a former florist and sporting goods store manager who had seen and ridden many electric bikes at trade shows. "There was no doubting their growing popularity."

It took three years for their company—dubbed Ebgo (an acronym for "Electric Bike—GO")—to launch its first commer-

cial model. That was the CC47, a step-through design that remains the company's bestseller. Designed by Alain exclusively for Costco and built in Asia, the first 200 units of the new bike sold out in just two days at the Costco warehouse in Drummondville.

Since then, Ebgo has been on a journey to the top of Canada's e-bike industry, selling tens of thousands of its three models—with Costco being the only retailer the company sells through.

Alain says Ebgo provides its customers with first-rate after-sale service both online and over the phone. "We have instructional videos on our website and a dynamic team that is always eager and happy to answer questions people may have in regard to maintenance or riding their e-bike," he says.

According to Alain, Ebgo is still growing and its products are evolving to embrace market trends, such as the recent addition of model CCEF, an off-road fat tire bike.

"We're always tweaking our designs in an effort to make our bikes easier for people to use and enjoy," Alain says. "We're very passionate about what we do." ■

Some like it hot

For heat and flavour, hot sauce is hard to beat

ove over, ketchup. Hot sauce is gaining ground as the world's most popular condiment. But hot sauce, which gets its piquancy from chile peppers, is far from new. The ancient Aztecs used it in their cuisine, for medicinal purposes and even in warfare.

Hot sauce preference is personal. Just ask the fans of Sriracha sauce, Frank's RedHot and Tabasco, who line up behind their favourites. "I always tell people to choose what speaks to them," says Julia Skinner, founder of Root-kitchens.com, where she teaches fermentation classes that include hot sauce production.

Sriracha sauce, which originated in Thailand, is fermented with garlic to achieve a spicy, slightly sour taste and thick consistency. Other sauces, such as Frank's RedHot and Tabasco, are produced by blending hot peppers and vinegar.

Hot sauces can be mild, medium or scorching, so, depending on your palate, you can find what suits you. There's a technical measurement for heat, called the Scoville scale, explains Heather Suter, owner of New York state's Greenport Fire, a specialty gift and hot sauce store. The hottest peppers in the world are rated over 1.5 million Scoville heat units (SHUs), she says.

At 1,750 SHUs, Frank's RedHot sauce occupies the other end of the spectrum; Sriracha sauce has around 2,500 SHUs and Tabasco Original Red Sauce comes in at 2,500 to 5,000 SHUs.

Because hot sauces differ in heat content, texture and even sweetness, experiment by cooking with them. Mix them with other condiments, such as ketchup, mayo and salad dressing, or add them to marinades or to spice up cocktails, such as bloody marys, margaritas and Caesars. Tabasco is great on eggs and fried fish, Sriracha sauce pairs well with Asian and Mexican cuisine, and try Frank's RedHot on nuts and popcorn.

As Skinner adds, don't be afraid to pick a favourite.

Chili Con Carne

15 mL (1 Tbsp) oil 750 g (13/4 lbs) lean ground beef 1 large onion, chopped 2 garlic cloves, minced 15 mL (1 Tbsp) chili powder 15 mL (1 Tbsp) ground cumin 1 (400 g/14 oz) can diced tomatoes 2 (400 g/14 oz each) cans red kidney beans, drained and rinsed Tabasco Original Red Sauce, to taste Salt and pepper, to taste Steamed long-grain rice, grated cheddar cheese, sour cream, for serving

Heat oil in a large pan over medium-high heat. Add the ground beef; cook until browned on all sides. Remove the beef to a bowl, using a slotted spoon.

Add the onion and garlic to the pan. Lower heat to medium and cook until they are soft, about 5 minutes. Return the beef to the pan, stir in the chili powder and cumin, and cook for 1 minute. Stir in the tomatoes with their liquid, plus the kidney beans, Tabasco, salt and pepper.

Bring to a boil, stirring occasionally. Turn down the heat, cover and simmer for 20 minutes to blend the flavours, stirring occasionally.

Serve chili with rice, cheese and sour cream. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

Tofu Buffalo Wings

908 q (2 lbs) extra-firm tofu 90 mL (6 Tbsp) cornstarch 1 mL (1/4 tsp) salt 1 mL (1/4 tsp) pepper 30 mL (2 Tbsp) light brown sugar 15 mL (1 Tbsp) smoked paprika 7 mL (1/2 Tbsp) chili powder 15 mL (2 Tbsp) oil

90 mL (6 Tbsp) mayonnaise 30 mL (2 Tbsp) tahini 10 mL (2 tsp) Dijon mustard 10 mL (2 tsp) apple cider vinegar 30 mL (2 Tbsp) chives, finely chopped 125 mL (1/2 cup) Frank's RedHot Original Sauce, plus more for serving

Preheat the oven to 205 C (400 F).

Drain and pat the tofu dry with a paper towel or a clean tea towel, and slice into 20 thin slices. Combine the cornstarch, salt, pepper, brown sugar, smoked paprika and chili powder, then toss tofu slices with mixture. Drizzle the tofu with the oil, transfer the tofu to a lined non-stick baking tray and bake for 30 minutes, or until golden, turning after 15 minutes.

Meanwhile, mix together the mayonnaise, tahini, Dijon mustard, vinegar and chives. Set aside.

When the tofu is cooked, spoon on the Frank's RedHot sauce and gently toss. Serve with the additional sauce on the side. Makes 4 servings.

friend of mine says roasting a seasoned whole chicken is "the world's easiest dinner." It's also one of the most satisfyingly delicious.

Whether it's fried, barbecued, roasted, braised, curried, in kebabs or in soup with noodles or matzo balls, chicken is endlessly variable, affordable and nourishing. About as big as a deck of cards, a 100-gram (3.5-ounce) serving of roasted chicken with skin contains 239 calories, 27 grams of protein and 13 grams of fat.

Skinless chicken breasts are very healthful, with 165 calories, 31 grams of protein and only 4 grams of fat per serving. Boneless breasts can be pounded or rolled thin for use in recipes such as chicken cordon bleu, schnitzel and chicken Marsala. It's best to flatten breasts when cooking with even, direct heat, such as searing or frying them in a pan, baking them in the oven, or poaching or braising them. The breast is the costliest part.

In contrast to breasts, leg quarters are the least expensive part. Containing more fat, thighs and legs are richer, more flavourful and perfect for grilling. Season them heavily and pan-fry them, skin side down, for delicious crispy skin, or oven roast them or use your air fryer. These scrumptious dark parts contain heart-healthy monosaturated fats.

Whether you prefer drumettes, which resemble small chicken legs, or wingettes, also known as flats, wings are great for sharing. They can be deep-fried, baked, air-fried or even cooked in a slow cooker and flavoured with sweet, savoury and/or spicy sauces or the traditional Buffalo sauce.

One note: Although chicken skin can be yummy, it contains saturated fat. For example, a baked breast with the skin has more than twice the fat of the same breast without the skin. To cut back on the fat, prepare chicken parts skinless, or leave the skin on, so the fat moistens the chicken during cooking, and then discard it.

Avoid overcooked and dry chicken by removing it from the heat source when the internal temperature of the thickest part of the breast is 82 C (180 F) for whole birds and 74 C (165 F) for pieces.

Simple, easy and delicious! ■

Chicken Cordon Bleu

2 (170 g/6 oz each) chicken breasts, boneless and skinless 6 to 8 slices Swiss cheese 4 to 6 thin prosciutto slices 60 mL (¼ cup) chickpea flour 1 mL (¼ tsp) sea salt, divided 1 mL (¼ tsp) freshly ground black pepper, divided 125 mL (½ cup) almond flour 4 sprigs fresh thyme, leaves only 1 garlic clove, minced 2 eggs 15 mL (1 Tbsp) extravirgin olive oil

Preheat oven to 205 C (400 F).

Lay the chicken between 2 pieces of plastic wrap. Using the flat side of a meat mallet, gently pound the chicken to 0.64-cm (¼-inch) thickness; take care not to pound too hard because the meat may tear or create holes. Remove the top plastic, placing the clean side down on the work surface. Move 1 breast to this plastic. Lay 2 slices of Swiss cheese on each breast, followed by 2 slices of prosciutto and then 2 additional slices of cheese; leave a 1.3-cm (½-inch) margin on all sides to help seal the roll. Tuck in the sides of the chicken, then roll it up tightly like a jelly roll inside the plastic wrap. Squeeze the log gently to seal and twist both ends tight. Repeat with the remaining chicken.

Season the chickpea flour with 0.5 mL (% tsp) each of salt and pepper; spread in a flat dish. Mix the almond flour with thyme, garlic and 0.5 mL (% tsp) each of sea salt and pepper in a separate flat dish. Beat eggs in a third dish.

Remove the chicken roulades from the plastic wrap. Lightly dust the chicken with the chickpea flour, then dip each in the egg mixture, then gently coat in the almond flour mixture. Lightly coat a baking pan or dish with the olive oil; carefully transfer the roulades into the pan. Bake until browned and cooked through, about 25 to 35 minutes, or when chicken reaches an internal temperature of 74 C (165 F). Cut into pinwheels before serving. Makes 2 servings.

The Best Grilled Chicken Thighs

MARINADE

355 mL (12 oz) beer 45 mL (3 Tbsp) barbecue dry rub 30 mL (2 Tbsp) soy sauce 30 mL (2 Tbsp) Worcestershire sauce 30 mL (2 Tbsp) balsamic vinegar 15 mL (1 Tbsp) garlic, minced 2 mL (½ tsp) coarse salt

8 to 12 boneless, skinless chicken thighs

Prepare the marinade: Stir all ingredients together in a large bowl.

Add the chicken thighs to the bowl, coating with marinade. Cover the bowl and refrigerate for a minimum of 1 hour, up to 24 hours.

Preheat a grill to medium-high heat. Remove the chicken from the marinade and pat dry. Grill chicken for 6 to 7 minutes per side, or until internal temperature reaches 74 C (165 F). Makes 8 to 12 servings.

Summer-ready CHEESECAKE

Serves 6

CRUST

250 mL (1 cup) graham cracker crumbs 125 mL (½ cup) walnuts or pecans 30 mL (2 Tbsp) granulated sugar 125 mL (1/2 cup) butter, melted

FILLING

1 package (8 oz) cream cheese, room temperature 125 mL (½ cup) powdered sugar 250 mL (1 cup) plain 2% Greek yogurt 5 mL (1 tsp) lemon zest 30 mL (2 Tbsp) lemon juice, separated 125 mL (½ cup) **Fresh Blueberries** 125 mL (½ cup) **Fresh Raspberries** 5 mL (1 tsp) gelatin 30 mL (2 Tbsp) warm water

TOPPING

250 mL (1 cup) whipped cream 250 mL (1 cup) Fresh Blueberries 250 mL (1 cup) Fresh Raspberries

Prepare a standard loaf pan by lining with parchment paper, leaving an overhang on the sides.

Using a food processor, pulse the graham crackers and nuts into fine crumbs. Add granulated sugar and melted butter to the food processor and pulse until combined. Press onto the bottom and slightly up the sides of the pan. Set aside.

In a small bowl, stir gelatin powder and water. Let bloom 10 minutes. In a small saucepan over medium heat, warm 15 mL (1 Tbsp) lemon juice, Fresh Blueberries and Fresh Raspberries. Stir continuously for 3 minutes until the berry juices begin to release. Smash the berries as the mixture continues to simmer for 2-3 minutes. Add the gelatin mixture, stir and let cool.

In a large bowl, beat cream cheese, powdered sugar, Greek yogurt, lemon zest and remaining juice until smooth and creamy, about 2-3 minutes. Mix in the cooled berry mixture until well combined.

Pour cheesecake filling over crust. Cover and chill in refrigerator 4 hours or overnight. Lift cheesecake out of pan using the parchment paper. Before serving, top with whipped cream, blueberries and raspberries. Serve cold.

Berry delicious

Blackberries and raspberries are bursting with sweet health benefits

lackberries and raspberries have been gathered worldwide as a nutritious food for thousands of years. These jewel-toned berries have slightly different structures, with raspberries sporting a centre pocket while blackberries contain a soft edible core. Both offer sweet flavour and nutrition benefits.

Just 250 millilitres (one cup) of the fresh berries provides about 30 milligrams of vitamin C, which is essential for immune health, healing wounds and more. With an impressive 8 grams per 250 millilitres (one cup), the fibre in these berries may help promote good gut health and keep blood sugar and blood cholesterol levels in check.

Storage tips

Keep the berries dry and refrigerated, and enjoy within a few days. Wait to rinse the berries until just before eating to stave off spoilage.

For longer shelf life, freeze berries in a single layer, then store in a freezer-safe container. Make a refrigerator jam or compote by cooking the berries with lemon juice and honey or sugar until the berries melt into a jammy consistency. Alternatively, use a water bath and a tested recipe to properly can raspberry jam or blackberry preserves for shelf-stable storage.

Recipe ideas

Blackberries and raspberries elevate both sweet and savoury recipes. Enjoy these berries as a stand-alone snack, over oats or tossed into a smoothie. Bake them into fragrant muffins, or prepare a simple dessert by layering white cake, fluffy whipped cream and berries.

Blend raspberries into a vinaigrette to liven up a simple spinach salad. Add a pop of colour and nutrition to waffles with a generous drizzle of warm raspberry sauce. Pair blackberries with creamy goat cheese, walnuts and arugula on flatbread, or roast a blackberry-glazed salmon for dinner.

The ways to enjoy these berries are boundless. ■

Lemon Raspberry Crumb Bars

CRUST/TOPPING

180 mL (3/4 cup) butter, at room temperature 250 mL (1 cup) brown sugar, packed 250 mL (1 cup) quick oats 330 mL (11/3 cups) flour 2 mL (1/2 tsp) salt 5 mL (1 tsp) baking powder

1 (397 g/14-oz) can sweetened condensed milk 125 mL (1/2 cup) lemon juice (about 2 large lemons) Zest of 1 lemon 1 egg yolk 250 g (1 cup) raspberries 15 mL (1 Tbsp) flour 30 mL (2 Tbsp) sugar

Preheat oven to 180 C (350 F).

Prepare the crust/topping: In a large bowl, mix together the crust/topping ingredients until there are no butter chunks and the mixture begins to clump together. Press three-quarters of the mixture on the bottom of a lightly greased 18 x 28-cm (7 x 11-inch) baking pan.

Prepare the filling: In a separate bowl, mix together the sweetened condensed milk, lemon juice, lemon zest and egg yolk. Spread onto the crust. Toss the raspberries with the flour and sugar. Mash lightly with a fork, keeping some fruit intact, then dollop the raspberries into the lemon filling. Crumble the remaining crust mixture over the top of the raspberries.

Bake 30 to 35 minutes or until the crust browns and the centre of the filling is set when tested with a toothpick. Cover with foil if browning occurs before the filling is set.

Chill 1 to 2 hours before cutting and serving. Cover and refrigerate any leftovers. Makes 12 servings.

Tip: Line the pan with parchment paper hanging over the sides to easily lift the dessert out of the pan.

Black and Blue Spring Salad

VINAIGRETTE

125 mL (1/2 cup) fresh blackberries 15 mL (1 Tbsp) sugar 30 mL (2 Tbsp) balsamic vinegar 30 mL (2 Tbsp) extra-virgin olive oil 15 mL (1 Tbsp) honey Salt and pepper. to taste

HONEY-ROASTED PECANS

7 mL (1/2 Tbsp) butter, melted 15 mL (1 Tbsp) honey 125 mL (1/2 cup) pecans Salt, to taste

145 g (5 oz) spring mix lettuce 340 g (12 oz) fresh blackberries 85 g (3 oz) blue cheese, crumbled

Prepare the vinaigrette: Place the blackberries and sugar in a food processor or blender, then blend until berries are crushed. Let sit for a minute, then add remaining vinaigrette ingredients and blend until smooth. Set aside.

Prepare the pecans: Preheat oven to 180 C (350 F). Pour melted butter into a bowl, then add honey and pecans; toss to coat. Spread out pecans on a parchment paper-lined baking sheet and bake for 5 to 6 minutes, or until brown and fragrant; watch carefully so they don't burn. Sprinkle lightly with salt and set aside to cool completely.

Divide the lettuce among plates. Top with the blackberries, blue cheese crumbles and honey-roasted pecans. Dress with berry-balsamic vinaigrette, then serve. Makes 2 to 4 servings.

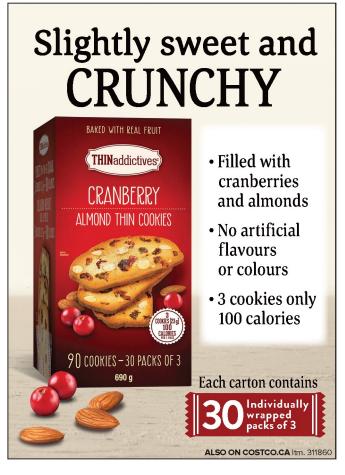

A ray of hope

Prevention, early detection help combat skin cancer

ay is Melanoma and Skin Cancer Awareness Month, which shines a spotlight on one of the most common—and most preventable—cancers. Most skin cancer is caused by damage from the sun's ultraviolet radiation (UV rays). Basal cell carcinoma is the most common form of skin cancer, affecting as many as 60,000 Canadians each year. Costco member Sandy Hargraves, an author in St. Andrews, New Brunswick, is among them.

In 2018, Hargraves noticed a quarter-sized, blister-like sore on her right shoulder that wouldn't heal. After a dermatologist diagnosed basal cell carcinoma, Hargraves began regularly applying Aldara, a medicated cream that stimulated her immune system. Three months later, the sore had finally healed. Between then and 2021, five more

basal cell carcinomas appeared—on her shoulders, forehead, chin and chest.

Hargraves, 57, expects to see more. "When I was young, no one talked about sunscreen," she says. "We didn't have the knowledge about skin cancer that we do now. Growing up, I played outdoors and lay out at the beach, and I tanned really well. I thought I looked better with a tan. We all feel pretty pasty in Canada after the winter, and our summer is so short, so you want to be in the sun as much as possible."

Know the numbers

Costco member Dr. Cheryl Rosen has heard women say they think they look better with a tan, as well as thinner and sexier. The head of Toronto Western Hospital's division of dermatology, and a professor in the University of Toronto's department of medicine, warns that



tanning poses serious, sometimes deadly, health risks.

"The incidence for melanoma, the most fatal form of skin cancer, is increasing," says Rosen.

It's important to note that anyone can get skin cancer. Melanoma develops in the cells that produce melanin, the pigment that gives skin its colour. According to the Canadian Cancer Society, if recent trends continue, 72% more new melanoma cases are expected to be diagnosed between 2028 and 2032 than were diagnosed between 2003 and 2007.

Better tools at hand

Thanks to developments in treatment over the last decade, patients with melanoma have a better chance of living longer.

Sunscreen formulations have also become more effective. "Canadian sunscreens have UVA-absorbing compounds that are not available in the U.S.," says Rosen. "They are more effective because they do a better job at protecting against UVA damage."

Addressing women who insist their face moisturizer with SPF 15 is adequate, Rosen says, "Moisturizers with sunscreen may not contain UVA-absorbing compounds, so they don't offer broad-spectrum protection. And 15 isn't a high enough sun protection factor. You need at least 30, and to apply it to all exposed skin. The risk of skin cancer far outweighs any possible chemical absorption."

When Hargraves hit her 40s, she started wearing sunscreen when she noticed signs of sun damage showing up in people around her. Today, she wears SPF 60 on her face (a higher number turns her face red and blotchy) and SPF 110 everywhere else, dons a wide-brimmed hat and a lightweight, long-sleeved T-shirt, and stays in the shade when possible.

Hargraves and her husband, Ryan, are going on a Mediterranean cruise in June. "I plan to enjoy myself, but I'm going to be cautious of my sun exposure," she says. "Now, when I see a woman who stays out of the sun, I notice that her skin is glowing. That should be our goal." ■

Sun safety tips

If Dr. Cheryl Rosen is going to be outside where there's no shade, she takes her own: a parasol. "Sunscreen is an important part of sun safety, but so is shade and covering up," she says. Sunglasses with 99% to 100% UVA and UVB absorption may help protect against eye melanomas.

When it comes to application, Rosen advises putting a bottle of sunscreen beside your toothbrush starting in April or May, and applying it in the morning after brushing your teeth, regardless of the forecast. And be practical; if your youngsters can't wear a wide-brimmed hat to play sports, slap on a baseball cap and slather sunscreen on exposed skin.—JD

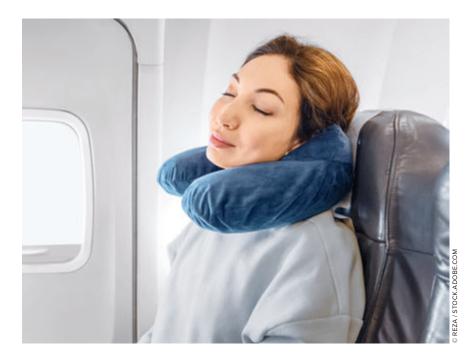




Pain-free travel

How to alleviate neck and lower back pain when you're on the go

ong-distance travel can be a pain in the neck—and the back. Here are four ways to help prevent strain and stress on your spine.

Handle with care. Costco member Ron Nusbaum, director of Back Clinics of Canada in Vaughan, Ontario, recommends packing light and using a rolling suitcase with extendable arms. "If you must lift heavy items, always bend your knees and have a straight back," he says. "Pivot your feet rather than twisting and carry heavy items close to your body."

Toronto-based Dr. Albert Yee, a Costco member and past president of the Canadian Spine Society, says: "A quick session by a trained physiotherapist can guide the mechanics of lifting objects."

Mind your posture. Sitting in cramped seats for long periods causes tension in joints, muscles and discs. A blanket or a rolled-up jacket between the seat and your back offers support to the curve of the lower back. Maintaining a neutral spine posture can help prevent

back stiffness. Nusbaum suggests keeping hips and knees at right angles and shoulders pulled back and down to improve sitting posture. You may also find it comfortable to sit in a reclined position.

Use a pillow. The head and shoulders usually slump forward, causing muscle and joint stiffness while trying to sleep in a seat. "Travel pillows offer support where we need it, especially when sitting for long periods," says Nusbaum. A comfortable neck pillow supports your head position when sleeping upright.

Move around. During long flights or rides, movement is the best way to keep the spine and neck comfortable. Getting out of a sitting posture helps keep your spine in a neutral position and can prevent back pain. Nusbaum suggests moving every 20 minutes when possible. When driving, make frequent stops to stretch and walk.

Hope for the future

Help for those born with cystic fibrosis

Canadians have cystic fibrosis
(CF), you may hear a lot more
about the disease this May,
which is CF Awareness Month. Just 70
years ago, those diagnosed with this rare
genetic disorder—which affects the lungs,
pancreas and other organs—rarely survived past elementary school age. Today,
with new but very costly therapies, more
than half of those with CF are over 18,
with the median survival age at just over
50 years old.

Two Canadians are diagnosed with CF every week, and the vast majority are diagnosed by the age of 2. More than 2,000 mutations are known to affect the CF gene. The result is that a defective cystic fibrosis transmembrane conductance regulator (CFTR) gene produces malfunctioning or no CFTR proteins; these proteins are responsible for ensuring that mucus in the body is the right consistency, and not thick and sticky.

This thick mucus in the pancreas, liver and intestines causes blockages that

stop enzymes from digesting food properly, which may lead to malnutrition, weight loss, a specific type of diabetes, liver problems and colorectal cancer. The poor quality of the mucus in the lungs causes bacteria not to be cleared out, and the result is many respiratory infections, inflammation and lung problems, potentially requiring a transplant.

While there is no cure for CF, some therapies have focused on clearing the mucus, reducing the inflammation in the lungs with inhaled medications or clearing the infection with antibiotics. Preventing infections through proper hygiene and immunizations is also important, and digestive enzymes can be helpful too.

Beyond all the medications and therapies, what many with CF need most are emotional support, a listening ear, a kind word, patience and understanding during their off days. More information can be found at Cysticfibrosis.ca.

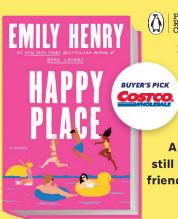

regulator (CFTR) modulators have been developed to fix the malfunctioning protein, depending on the type of mutation causing the disease. They do not help people who produce no CFTR protein at all, which makes up about 5% of those with cystic fibrosis.—*LV*

Comedy of the heart

Emily Henry has found her new happy place in romance

hen No. 1 New York Times bestselling author Emily Henry sat down to write Happy Place, she thought it might be an over-the-top screwball comedic romance. She had been watching comedies of remarriage from the 1940s, like The Philadelphia Story, Bringing Up Baby and The Lady Eve—movies where the whole conceit was to get a couple back together. Henry thought she'd bring that fun, slapstick energy to her own plot about two characters falling back in love.

But as she wrote, it became less comical and more heartwarming—tinged with heartbreak. "I thought about what might happen to pull two people apart," she tells the *Connection* from her home in Cincinnati, Ohio. "How do they meaningfully break up, and then how do you make it possible for them to get back together so it's not a toxic decision?"

While each draft of *Happy Place* relied less on belly laughs and more on heartstrings, Henry—a master of quippy, sexy banter—retained plenty of levity. With her perfectly timed sarcasm and easy comebacks, her fast-paced dialogue has been compared to *Gilmore Girls*, a coming-of-age television series from the 2000s. It's the ultimate compliment, she says. "I am [in] that subset of millennials [who are] exactly the right age to have been raised by *Gilmore Girls*."

Happy Place centres on the relationship of Harriet and Wyn, who have been together for eight years and are engaged. Only, they've broken up months before, but their close-knit group of friends doesn't know it. When they wind up (accidentally) going on vacation together to the group's usual summer spot in Maine, the plot thickens. Henry overlaps past with present, winding through years of Harriet and Wyn's history as the week in Maine progresses and the tension builds.

While Harriet and Wyn's story drives the action, it's an ensemble cast, featuring Kimmy and Cleo (who fell in love and run a farm) and Sabrina and Parth (who are getting married). Henry really wanted to explore the dynamics among a group of friends in their early 30s. "In your 20s, you're mostly in the same stage of life with your friends and have a lot of common ground," she says. But once people reach their 30s, lives can start to diverge, with friends getting married or divorced, having kids or changing careers. She sees it in her own life: "I'm in this stage of life where my friends and I have different things going on."

Out of college, Henry wrote young adult fiction and published four novels. "I wanted to write the kinds of books that I was loving as a reader," she says. Plus, in her early 20s, she says, she wouldn't have been able to write meaningfully about older characters. She fell into writing adult fiction-romance almost by accident. To get over a bout of writer's block, she decided to just start writing a character who had writer's block. It turned into *Beach Read* and secured her a new base of readers. She's found a home in romance, a genre she absolutely loves as a reader (her favourites right now are novelists Kennedy Ryan, Talia Hibbert and Sonali Dev). "I am perfectly content to wake up every day and just write," she says.

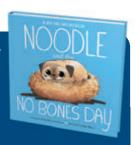

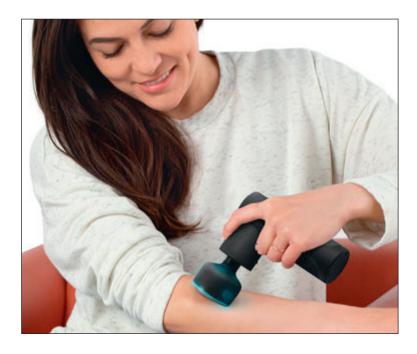
